A new play by Chana Cox, senior lecturer in the Humanities at Lewis & Clark College, **Pharaoh** retells the story of the Exodus in a fresh, compelling way - a miracle play of the Old Testament. Raised almost as brothers, Pharaoh and Moses find themselves on two sides of the religious and political questions of freedom and slavery, oppression and redemption. One believes he is the prophet of God, the other believes he is a god. Like all great stories of antiquity, Exodus also speaks to modern times. It crosses religious, racial and political divides, and each group that sees it brings to the story it's own memories.
